# Land conservation on Capitol Hill

We took our voice to Capitol Hill this month in support of land conservation for Sonoma County. Through three days of advocacy organized by the Land Trust Alliance, executive director Dave Koehler joined land trust colleagues from around the country to meet with our U.S. senators and representatives to address land conservation issues that are at stake as budget appropriations are being made. The Land and Water Conservation Fund is our nation's premier land conservation program and, over the last 50 years, it has supported over 41,000 land protection projects. However, the future of LWCF is in jeopardy due to funding appropriation issues and requires reauthorization by this September.

LWCF is one of the funding sources we look to for leveraging private philanthropy for land protection in areas like San

## New snake observed at Glen Oaks Ranch



No matter how well you think you know the land, there's always something new and surprising waiting around the corner or, in this case, in the tall grass. On an early morning visit to Glen Oaks Ranch, new stewardship staffer Katy Reynolds came across this beautiful Western Yellow-bellied Racer (*Coluber constrictor mormon*), a species that had not yet been recorded on the property. Although quite large — this one was approximately three feet in length, but they can reach six — and very aggressive, these grey and yellow snakes are non-venomous. As their name implies, they're quick — capable of reaching speeds of over four miles per hour. Along with their speed, they are known for their highly-spirited personality; "I could hardly manage to snap a picture between its many attempts to snap at me!," laughs Katy!
