# Live Oaks Ranch forest treatments



Live Oaks Ranch forest treatments—thinning, prescribed burning, pruning and mechanical understory treatments, such as mastication or mowing—often have multiple purposes. At Live Oaks Ranch, in Knights Valley, we designed our forest treatments to increase freshwater availability, reduce the likelihood of fire spreading to the forest canopy and improve habitat for species traveling along the riparian corridor of Bidwell Creek.

The reason for our focus was the 2017 Tubbs Fire, which burned hot along the creek and caused extensive damage to riparian corridor vegetation. Before post-fire creek restoration can begin, however, the forest adjacent to Bidwell Creek must be managed so that it will be more fire-resilient and burn cooler in future fires. We are pleased that, for long-term forest management, many of the units we treated are lending themselves well to

# Land Trust is one of the first to cut green tape



Sonoma Land Trust recently completed a design for the Lakeville Creek Restoration Project, located at Sears Point Ranch in southern Sonoma County. The project, when complete, will restore stream function for three-quarters of a mile of stream, along with wildlife habitat, groundwater and seasonal wetlands. It's a big project and a groundbreaking one. Until now, the cost of permitting even smaller stream restoration projects could potentially exceed the cost of the restoration itself. Additionally, the process of satisfying the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) can be extraordinarily time intensive.

Considering the rapid and devastating effects of climate change on our rivers and streams, processes clogged by high costs and slow paperwork before restoration can even begin are unacceptable. Recognizing that regulatory processes needed to be streamlined without compromising oversight, the California Natural Resources Agency, under Governor Newsom's direction, launched the <u>Cutting the Green Tape</u> initiative. The initiative is part of the larger 30x30 effort to conserve 30 percent of the state's land and coastal waters by 2030.

With the help of consultant Prunuske Chatham, Inc. and California Department of Fish and Wildlife staff, our project became the second in the state to qualify for the
