# Jenner Headlands and Pole Mountain are opening to the public!

Beginning September 7, both the Land Trust's Pole Mountain and The Wildlands Conservancy's Jenner Headlands will open to the public daily from 8am-sunset. Visitors to Sonoma County's stunning coast will now have the opportunity to explore at their leisure and free of charge the 15 miles of trails on the spectacular, 5,630-acre Jenner Headlands Preserve and to climb to the top of Pole Mountain, the highest peak along the Sonoma Coast. Parking and access to both preserves will be provided free of charge at TWC's beautiful new "Gateway to the Headlands" along Highway 1, two miles north of Jenner. Hikers taking up the challenge to summit Pole Mountain from the Gateway parking lot are encouraged to head out early to complete the strenuous, 14mile round-trip hike on the Sea to Sky Trail by sunset. Large crowds are expected on the opening weekend of September 7-9 so please plan accordingly as the parking lot may fill. Remember, it will be open every day! ### Seeking development staffer

In 2016, the Land Trust installed over 100 native plants along Stuart Creek at Glen Oaks Ranch as part of a habitat restoration project. The purpose of the project was to restore critical habitat for animals roaming within the Sonoma Valley Wildlife Corridor. In October of last year, the habitat planting — along with hundreds of acres of wildland in and around the ranch — burned in the Nuns fire. The entire irrigation system, as well as roughly 50 percent of the plants, were destroyed. However, in a hopeful display of nature's resiliency, the remaining half of the plants, including California rose (Rosa californica), elderberry (Sambucas mexicana) and California coffeeberry (Rhamnus/Frangula californica), began showing signs of new life out of the ashes in the spring — budding and sprouting bright-green foliage. These hardy survivors are now thriving thanks to a dedicated group of volunteers who are hand watering the plants until the irrigation is restored!

The birds are returning





On Tuesday, the Board of Directors for Sonoma Ag + Open Space approved the purchase of a conservation easement over the Donnell Ranch — a 978-acre property on southern Sonoma Mountain. Adjacent to Tolay Regional Park, which now includes the Land Trust's former Tolay Creek Ranch, donated to Regional Parks last year, the conservation of Donnell Ranch is part of a system of protected land on southern Sonoma Mountain that extends to wetlands of the San Pablo Bay National Wildlife Refuge. Sonoma Land Trust received a \$720,000 grant from the Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation to support the total purchase price of the easement - \$3.812 million. "Thanks to landowners like the Donnell Family and the partnership between Sonoma Land Trust and Ag + Open Space, the scenic backdrop to Tolay Regional Park is now protected forever," says SLT conservation director Wendy Eliot.
