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# Planting native species to prevent non-natives from taking root

As part of our ongoing effort to establish tidal marsh at Sears Point, Sonoma Land Trust has recently partnered with the <u>San</u> <u>Francisco Estuary Invasive Spartina Project</u> to plant native *Spartina foliosa*, a signature tidal marsh species — better known as California cordgrass — on top of select marsh mounds. The Spartina Project works to eradicate non-native *Spartina* species, which have spread rapidly in Bay Area wetlands over the last 25 years. Planting native *Spartina* at Sears Point will help prevent nonnative species from gaining a foothold there. Squares of PVC pipe connected by rope were built around each planting site as a barrier to prevent geese from eating the plants. This work builds on the successful research at Sears Point of SFSU grad student Margot Buchbinder and researchers at the <u>National Estuarine Research</u> <u>Reserve</u>.
