In partnership with Regional Parks and Sonoma County Ag + Open Space, we are completing an acquisition of 54 undeveloped acres immediately adjacent to and north of Taylor Mountain Regional Park and Open Space Preserve in southeastern Santa Rosa. Upon closing tomorrow, we will immediately transfer the property, Cooper Creek, to Sonoma County Regional Parks.

Bay Camp, also known as el Campamento de la Bahía, is our bilingual summer day camp that connects children ages 7-12 with the growing tidal marsh system of the San Pablo Bay National Wildlife Refuge. Campers take part in learning about the salt marsh ecosystem, arts and crafts, and confidencebuilding activities like kayaking and bicycling. Through our community partners, we're able to reach and better serve youth who otherwise may not have opportunities to attend summer camps, and we are hopeful that, by summer, COVID-19 will be behind us and our local kids will be able to take part in these fun and educational activities. Last year, Bay Camp provided over 60 percent of campers with their first summer camp experience and offered full scholarships to 74 percent of our eligible campers. "Joan is the one to talk to if you want to learn about dedicating land to permanent open space." This quote, from the organization's first newsletter in 1977, highlights the key role Joan Vilms played in setting the foundation of Sonoma Land Trust. She was instrumental in closing our first land acquisitions, including Little Black Mountain Preserve outside Cazadero and Secret Pasture Preserve overlooking the Sonoma Valley. She negotiated countless land acquisition requests and conservation easements, ensuring that all projects the Land Trust pursued met the organization's conservation goals. She also began Sonoma Land Trust's first tree-planting campaign, which resulted in 34,000 trees being planted at Little Black Mountain in the heart of the Creighton Ridge Fire burn area. A former resource management consultant and county planner, Joan served as our first Land Counselor, helping establish the organization that today has a national reach and reputation, evidenced by our receiving the Land Trust Alliance's 2019 National Excellence Award, a tribute to the most outstanding land trust in the United States.
