Thanks to our partnership with <u>The Wildlands</u> <u>Conservancy</u> and acquisition funders like <u>Sonoma Ag + Open</u> <u>Space</u> and <u>California Coastal Conservancy</u>, and supporters like you, residents and visitors alike can now hike 15 miles of trail (up and back) to deepen their connection with the Sonoma Coast. We estimate that, each month, a few thousand cars drive to the Gateway to the Jenner Headlands parking lot on Highway 1, and around 100 hikers make it to

At the Art Show and Sale on September 14, the Sonoma Land Trust panel of judges presented artist Greg LaRock with our Heart of the Land award for his beautiful interpretation of Glen Oaks Ranch (pictured above). "On my early morning arrival [to Glen Oaks Ranch], I was rewarded with beautiful morning light creating wonderful shadows on the old buildings surrounded by greens. I enjoyed the little white structure and how it was bookended by the buildings on either side. A nice path led you into the scene and the balance of the old historic area contrasted by the newer vineyard in the background seemed to bridge the past with the future," says Greg.
